3.1	For DHS, EPA, HHS, or VA research certification is required that that the duties of the IRB under this section have been fulfilled.
3.2	<minimal risk=""> has a specific definition when applied to prisoners. See "POLICY: Definitions (HRP-001)"</minimal>
3.3	For example, vaccine trials and other research on hepatitis which is much more prevalent in prisons than elsewhere; and research on social and psychological problems such as alcoholism, drug addiction, and sexual assaults.
3.4	For research subject to DHS, HHS, or VA regulations, the applicable official is the Department Secretary. For research subject to DOD regulations, the applicable official is the Director, Defense, Research, and Engineering.
3.5	OHRP interprets control groups which may not benefit from research to include a control group receiving standard of care that the prisoners would otherwise receive, services as usual, or a placebo.
